Mashal is engaged in the noble mission of translating the human values of love, equality, justice and peace into social action.


While facing the challenges created by the pandemic Covid-19, Mashal has contributed significantly to the community's health, education, skill training of youth, income generation activities of women's groups and sustainable agriculture. Through both the Health Centres and Social Action Units, we have been able to reach out to 2,26,281 people addressing the Health Care Needs, as well as the developmental challenges of gender parity, social exclusion, illiteracy, digital gap among the students, unemployment, malnutrition and poverty particularly of the migrant families and ecological concerns.

One of the significant achievements of the year is the effort during the yearlong lockdown, to support continuation of education of 1800 students whose parents could not afford to provide the devices to access online education, through Bridge School Centers and Mobile Resource Centers supported by Unicef.

Mashal has added a new chapter to its history by entering into collaboration with NABARD for promoting integrated development of tribal communities in Haveli Kharagpur Block of Munger District of Bihar. Addressing the impoverishment of tribal caused by climate change, the project focuses on Wadi development in the arid land of the tribal as well as income generation activities for the landless tribal families.

These initiatives have been possible because of the visionary leadership of the organization, timely advice and guidance of the Board Members, support and collaboration of Govt. officials and donors, and hard work of committed staff. I take this opportunity to thank and appreciate everyone for the support and collaboration we at Mashal have received in order to carry forward the vision and mission of Mashal.

REPORTS OF HEALTH CENTERS

Mashal seeks to provide affordable and quality health care to rural population especially the most vulnerable of the society through its Health Centers.

The four Health Centres of Mashal are Notre Dame Health Centre, Jamalpur, Munger Dt., Navjeevan Health Centre, Sasaram, Rohtas Dt., Sheetal Swasthya Kendra, Sheikhpura, Sheikhpura Dt., Sanjeevan Community Health Centre, Gahiri, West Champaran Dt.

Medical Facilities

- Day Care of patients
- Alternative system of Medicine: Physiotherapy, Nugabed, Massage
- Minor surgery: Incision & drainage
- Laboratory investigation tests: Hb, CBC, Blood sugar, Blood grouping and typing, HIV VDRL, Urine Analysis, Semen Analysis, Urine Pregnancy test, TFT, LFT, RFT, Uric Acid, ASO, RA Factor, MP, Widal.
- Facility for ultrasonography
- Immunization for BCG, DPT, MMR, Measles, Typhoid, Rotavirus, Chicken pox, Hepatitis B, Hepatitis A, PCV and Tetanus Toxoid, Pneumococcal and Rotavirus.
- attend to the snake bite cases day and night throughout the year in Gahiri.
- care of the patients with snake bite, scorpion sting and lizard bite in Sheikhpura.

Navjeevan Health Centre in Sasaram is approved by the Government as DMC and treatment Centre under Revised National Tuberculosis Control Programme (RNTCP). The Centre gets free anti TB drugs and reagents for the lab test for treatment of the patients who visit our Health Centre. 50 patients benefit from this prog.

Health Education

To staff- on Covid-19, weight checking, Blood pressure, pulse and taking temperature, diarrhea, anemia, TB, leprosy, HIV, hypertension, diabetes, jaundice, immunization etc. moderated by Sr. Dr. Anushila.

To Patients- on Covid-19 protocol; social distance, use of mask, hand washing, and use of sanitizer.

Covid Relief Activity:

- Provided rations for 100 families
- Stitched masks and distributed to patients
- Posters on Covid-19 were posted at the entrance, waiting hall and cash counter of the Health Centre for the education of patients on Covid-19.
- We stitched cloth masks and distributed to the poor patients.
- Concession worth about 53,000.00 (Fifty-Three Thousand only) was given on medicines to poor and migrants.

NARRATIVE REPORT OF SOCIAL ACTION CENTRES

Focus Area: Education

One of the worst affected victims of the pandemic are children who had no access to regular education. While a lot of children had the means for online classes, children of marginalized communities were deprived of learning as they had no access to computers or smart phones nor could they get support of parents for home learning. Addressing this issue, Mashal in collaboration of Unicef Bihar, initiated this project to provide underprivileged children access to continuous learning. Given below are the highlights of this project.

Title of the project: To support continuation of learning during school closure and mainstream Out of School Children amidst lockdown and unlock situation.

Funding Partner: UNICEF Bihar

Area of Implementation: 15 villages in Nautan Block, Dt.West Champaran and 30

Centres in Ariari and Sheikhpura Blocks of Sheikhpura Dt.

Duration of the Project: 15.09.2020 to 31.07.21

Program Output – 1: E-learning facilitated for 1800 students (600 and 1200) aged 06-18 in 15 centres at West Champaran and 30 centres at Sheikhpura district through a Mobile Learning Resource Centre that went to the villages at regular intervals making it possible for the children to catch up with their lessons.

Outcome: In 45 villages 1851 students (1134 girls and 717 boys) attended the regular MLRC programme. The lessons prepared by Bihar Education Project Council in collaboration with Unicef were taken up with the students in MLRC. It has helped to resolve the digital divide to some extent.

Outcome:

1842 students (1126 girls and 716 boys) are attending Centres as against the target of 1350 students. 591 girls readmitted to schools as against the target of 450. 80% of the students regularly attended the classes and 70% of the students have achieved the skills expected of them. Continuous professional development monitoring, and enhanced student learning outcomes.

Program Output – 3: 1350 Parents and elders participate in the awareness creation seminars on the value of girl children and importance of their higher education

Outcome: 20-30 parents participated in the meetings regularly. Mediums like videos, stories and games were used to stimulate critical thinking and analysis of their issues. Such meetings have resulted in regular attendance, students coming on time to most of the Centers and improvement in hygienic practices.

Program output 4: parents participate in the interface meeting with NRST team and strengthen "transitional schooling".

Outcome:

In all the meetings the participants promised help to get the students admitted or readmitted to schools as well as assured cooperation in running the NRBCCs

Animators and Supervisor got help in resolving issues like children's irregularity and absenteeism at centers.

945 students (591 girls and 354 boys) were re-admitted or admitted in the school:

Program output 5: Mothers/Parents & community members participate in training in social security schemes and income generating programme

Outcome: People are aware of the schemes and approach the concerned offices for availing them. Most of the mothers are joining Jeevika funded Self Help Groups and have begun to take up income generating activities. 302 person got Job Cards and MANREGA. 11 families got ration cards with which they can get free ration.



Challenges and Mitigation;

Lockdown due to second wave of COVID-19 pandemic

Centres were closed during the days of lockdown. When lockdown was lifted and movement of people were allowed, we gathered the children in the same tolas. They were given masks, kept social distancing and soap and water was kept at the centre so that they could wash their hands when they came to the centre and went from the centre. Those who had symptoms of fever or cold were told not to come for classes.

Seasonal work of the parents

The classes were kept at a convenient time for the children to attend the classes. Even then some who carried food for their parents or who were in the field picking up fallen grains or potatoes couldn't attend the classes. After the season the animators visited the families and brought the children back to the Centres.



Education Project:2

India is one of the nations in the world with a very high number of out-of-school children in the primary level. Despite decades of efforts, a vast majority of population in India continues to remain outside the education system. Education, being the key tool in the process of lifting marginalized communities from the vicious cycle of poverty and deprivation, our Organization, MASHAL, is committed to working with these communities to improve their educational status as well as lead them forward in the process of empowerment.

Outcome: The training helped the 22 project animators learn about project concept and objectives, Skills for animation of adolescent girls, Skills for Joyful Learning methods, TOT on formation and processing of Kishori Adalat (Adolescent Girls' Court) at Panchayat level, TOT on Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM), TOT on Children's Protection Policy and Child line, Discussion on Child Protection Policy of Mashal. They are empowered to contribute to social transformation through education of the out-of-school children and meetings with their parents.

3. To increase awareness on Girls' education, RTE, and Central and State government schemes which have been started for girls for reducing dropout rate and increasing the literacy rate.

A. One day village meeting with villagers of 120 villages to sensitize them on Right to Education (RTE), and to identify the barriers faced by girls in attending school regularly and on time

Outcome:

- Parents became aware of the importance of education and several parents promised to send their children, girls and boys both to school regularly.
- A committee was formed to ensure that girls go regularly to school and to collaborate in all the project activities.

Outcome: The meetings helped to improve the network between the Government department and our organization. The administration is more aware of the ground realities of the poor and are willing to step in to improve the situation.



Activity :4
Sensitizing girls on the importance of education, building self-confidence and motivation to make the decision regarding their right to education:

- 4.1. Weekly Guidance for Strengthening the Girls' Forum (Kishori Munch): in 120 Centres
- 4.2. Monthly Cultural Classes of Girls' Forum in 120 Centres
- 4.3. 3 Days Life Skill Training in all the Centres. 1446 girls participated.
- 4.4. 20 days intensive coaching attended by 173 girls.
- 4.5. BBOSE (Bihar Board Open Schooling and Examination) Linkage benefitted 24 girls.
- 4.6. One-day-workshop on RTE and celebration of International Girl Child's Day at Block level in all 5 districts participated by 2279 girls.

Education Project 3:

Name of the project: Community Based Awareness Generation initiative and Non-Residential Bridge course for education and Empowerment of rural Poor adolescents (Girls & Boys).

Funding Partner: UNICEF, Patna

Area of Implementation: 20 centres in Sheikhpura district, Bihar

Duration of the Project: October 2019 to December 2020

Main Activities;

1. One Day Awareness Programme for Parents:

A mobile van with posters and slogans moved around in the villages giving the message of RTE. Several audio visual clippings were displayed on the large TV screen. People from 20 villages participated in the awareness building meetings and were motivated to take actions to promote education as organized community based groups. The women became aware of the need to send their children regularly to school and



support them at school to improve the functioning of the schools.

Participants: 47 Men and 467 Women

2. Life Skill Training:



Life Skill training was conducted for 300 (200 girls and 100 boys) adolescents who are studying in the Flexible Learning Centres supported by the project. The training helped them to develop skills of listening, leadership and self-confidence. Post training much

improvement was noticed in hygiene related to drinking water, use of toilets, cleanliness of one's home and village.

3. Special Events:

a. Literacy Day celebrated in 20 villages: No.of participants: boys 190 and girls 353



On the occasion of the Literacy day on 8 September, cultural activities and competitions were organised in all the 20 villages, to create awareness on the importance of education of children. The opportunity helped children develop self-confidence and encouragement to

pursue their education against all odds.

b. International Girl Child day Celebration in 20 villages; No.of participants: Girls 346

and Boys 183.

On 10 and 11 October 2020 the international girl child day was celebrated at 20 FLC Centres. The themes of various events focused on upholding equal rights of girls. The strong message that was communicated was that girls can be powerful agents of change and nothing should keep them away from participating fully in all areas of life.



c. Interface Meeting with the parents, teachers and animators:

Participants: 586 parents, 47 staff, and 13 elected PRI leaders



The discussions focused on accessing quality education by the children and the role of parents and community in ensuring quality education for the children. Many children got help to tap the government schemes for students with the help of community leaders.

2. Focus Area; Promotion of Sustainable Agriculture and Natural Resources

Project 1: Increased food security and gender equality through agro- related livelihood activities

Funding Partner: German Doctors Forum

Name of the project: "Increased food security and gender equality through agro-related livelihood activities".

Area of Implementation: 30 villages from 4 Panchayats of Charpokhari Block in Bhojpur District

Duration: January 2020 to March 2021

"Commercialization of agriculture" with indiscriminate use of fertilisers and pesticides has caused large scale ecological issues such as soli alkalinity and salinity, micronutrient deficiency, water logging and fast depletion and contamination of ground water. Agro-related livelihood and food security has been adversely affected. To address these concerns, Mashal mobilized 300 marginal women farmers of 30 villages in Charpokhari Block of Bhojpur Dt., Bihar to work toward increasing agriculture and livestock production through promotion of organic and improved farming and improved livestock management practices.

Output:

- i) 234 women learned about various schemes available with agriculture department and are doing the needful for accessing benefits.
- ii) 255 women benefitted from training on improved agriculture and livestock management practices both in the villages as well as at Krishi Vigyan Kendra (KVK), Ara and in the Veterinary College, Patna
- iii) 74 women have participated in the training on organic farming and have begun using backyard manure in their vegetable gardens
- iv) 26 women got Rs. 2000/- each for 3 months from the government as support for marginal farmers.
- v) 162 families got the free ration of food kits promised by Government during lockdown.
- vi) 60 women began goat rearing and 100 women took to poultry farming.









Project 2: Integrated Tribal Development Programme

Funding Partner: NABARD

Name of the project: Integrated Tribal Development Programme

Area of Implementation: 10 Santhal Tribal Villages in Haveli Kharagpur Block, Munger

District

Duration: March 2021- February 2027

WADI, literally meaning a 'small orchard' of one to two acres, is an innovative approach by NABARD for providing the tribal communities a secured livelihood and for promoting ecologically sustainable economic activities. With the support of NABARD, Mashal has initiated the Integrated Tribal Development Programme in 15 villages of Santhal tribals in Haveli Kharagpur Block of Munger District. Interventions planned are: Wadi development in at least half acre of 160 tribal families, goat rearing for 40 landless families, Women Development activities, and Healthcare activities. Community mobilisation was carried out through meetings and PRA. 160 Acres of arid land vacant for years will be utilised for developing horticulture.





3. Focus Area: Skill Development Training of Rural Youth

Educated unemployed youth are an emerging issue of the marginalised communities where we work. Skill Development Training Programme of Mashal is an initiative that seeks to impart employable skills to the rural youth from marginalized communities. Along with formal courses such as CCA, DCA, ADCA and Tally, foundational skills in English communication, personality development and soft skills are imparted to prepare the youth for job market.

Name of the project: Computer Skill Development Training for 320 Rural Youth and animal rearing for sustenance to cover 40 families in the district of Sheikhpura

Area of Implementation: Sheikhpura

Duration: January 2021 to December 2021

In the emerging political and economic scenario of the country and now with COVID 19 Pandemic, there is an urgent need to address the issue of unemployment among the youth and provide livelihood particularly to the migrant families. In rural areas the children are deprived of opportunity for learning computer just because they do not have the facility and their parents are illiterate. Responding to these issues, Mashal began computer education and short term professional courses for youth in Sheikhpura District. The 40 SHG women whose husbands had returned from work due to the pandemic are being given milking animals for livelihood. The monetary help given as loan will be returned to the Federation forming a revolving fund which will then be used for providing milking animals to other needy women.







4. Focus Area: Empowerment of Women and Girls

Project 1. Asha-Kiran Home for Girls

Name of the Project: Home For girls (Asha Kiran)

Funding Partner: Child Protection Society, Government of Bihar

Area of Implementation: Patna District, Bihar

50 girls have been restored to their families, 5 girls transferred to other Homes and 2 girls were sent for diploma course in Hotel Management in Bangalore.

During the year as pandemic spread, the girls were given awareness creation on Covid-19,

its spread and safety measures by the staff in the Home as well as from the Child Protection Society. Training was organized by National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child development (NIPCID), Delhi on Helping Children to Cope up with the Stress during COVID – 19, Pandemic.

Ensuring holistic development of girls coming to the Home is of paramount importance to us. Hence following the Covid-19, protocols, number of activities were undertaken. Children prepared special paintings, posters, models; poems and speeches related to protection of environment on Observation of World Environment Day. On World Day Against Child Labour Children participated in a painting competition organized by Railway Child Line. All the important national days were observed with cultural activities and competitions. We for Child Protection, an international forum for child protection conducted paining competition to promote child rights. On World Children's day on 20th November, children attended a webinar conducted by







Brahma Kumaris on the theme "celebration of child rights and education for all". Celebrations were held on Teacher's Day, Children's Day, Diwali, Christmas etc.

Area of Implementation: 7 tribal & 18 dalit villages of Dharhara & Jamalpur Blocks of

Munger district

Duration: April 2020 to March 2021

GOAL: Eradicate early marriage of girl child and achieve financial empowerment of women

and girls

Major Achievements:

Campaigns on Child Rights





- 385 SHG women gained knowledge on the provisions of POCSO act, rights of children for education, health and safe environment.
- 226 girls and 140 boys' became aware of and identified issues of child right violations in families and society at large and are motivated to bring about changes.
- 170 men participated in the campaign and understood the legal aspects of violations of child rights and sexual offenses.
- 19 Child protection committees were formed to address the issue of Child Abuse at village level.

Empowerment of Adolescent Girls (ADGS)

- Eleven panchayat level committees are formed in 11 panchayats to create support system to prevent early marriages
- 185 parents organised marriages only after the girls were above 18 years.
- 490 adolescent girls continue their education from 8th class to 12th saying no to early marriage.
- 164 youth girls and boys were given career guidance.
- 31 youth attended Don Bosco Skill training on various trades like hotel management, office assistance, Data entry operator, Consumer Relation Management, General Physician Assistance courses and are employed.
- 24 youth received Diploma in Computer education and are employed in various institutions or continuing studies.
- 07 young women out of 14 who participated in the six months beautician course are earning income through beauty culture in their villages.
- 22 young women including adolescent girls were taught cutting and tailoring and 18
 of them are employed and supporting their families.

Empowerment of Women

- Income generation programmes (IGP) of SHG women are supported at three levels
 (Federation level, SHG level and through DIDI bank)
- Federation initiated four Didi Shops to provide marketing facilities to SHG members to sell their products of income generation programme. They are engaged in producing detergent powders, soaps, hand wash, Sanifresh, phenyl, vim, liquid soap and herbal shampoos. Herbal preparations like Avala Murabha, Avala Arishttam, Chawanprash, Neem oil, medicinal oils for massage etc. and other products such as Sathu, basan, puffed rice, milk products like curd, peda & ghee, and masalas, bamboo baskets and soaps are sold at Didi shops at Dasarathpur.
- <u>Didi bank</u> is supporting SHG women in 66 IGPs in agriculture, live stocks, food processing and various shops which provides essential things.

SHGs are providing finances for the following income generation programmes to 338 members engaged in: goat rearing, rearing cows and selling milk, making Bamboo baskets and soaps, agricultural production like rice, wheat, vegetables, and pulses, rearing buffaloes, cutting and tailoring, running grocery shops, vegetable shops, bangle shops, readymade garments shops, furniture shops snacks and panipuri shops, beauty parlour, poultry farm, piggery, promoting herbal items like Avala Murabha, Arishttam, Chayawanprash and eucalyptus cough elixir etc.

- Upgrading Government Middle School of Bellokar to High school

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Impact Assessment of Social Action Wing of Mashal

An impact assessment of the Social Action Involvement of Mashal over the last 10 years was done. The study was done with technical support from Catholic Relief Services (CRS). As part of the study, Mashal's organizational assessment was done. To assess the effectiveness, efficiency and impact of the Social Action involvements, Focus Group Discussions and Key Informant Interviews were done with the members and leaders of Self-Help Groups, Adolescent Girls' groups, local leaders, government officers etc. The interviews were conducted and recorded by the animators of 7 seven Social Action Centres of Mashal and the beneficiaries were selected at random from the project villages of these seven units. The process of Assessment that began in January 2020 ended only in May 2021 due to the delay caused by the spread of the pandemic. The results of the Assessment showed that the projects of Mashal were implemented effectively and efficiently. Growth is seen in economic, social and cultural parameters. 100% of the respondents appreciated the interventions of Mashal and shared that they were relevant.

After an analytical study of the report, the members suggested that we review the Strategic plan made for 2017-2022 and make a new strategic plan for the future involvements.

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Mashal is grateful to the General Body and Governing Body, the donors and well-wishers, the Unit level Directors, Administrators and staff for rendering selfless service in caring for the health particularly during the pandemic days. Due to the nationwide lockdown, many project activities had to be rescheduled. But the determination and commitment of the staff helped us complete the planned activities of various projects
